
### **Permeable Sidewalks** are the latest thing on the City's east side.

The Mission Village Flea Market at 18th & Alabama is over. A new government sponsored, housing project will begin construction on the old truck rental lot later this summer. The site was made available for the market at the request of Mission community groups, while the new owners secured their building permits.
